

Welcome to the 23rd Annual



The Ridges Sanctuary, along with our partners in conservation, invites you to join us in celebrating the natural beauty of the Door Peninsula at the 23rd Annual Door County Festival of Nature, May 23-25. The theme of this year's festival is **Grounded Perspectives**.

Think of your first memories in nature: wading in a shallow stream while searching for snails, making "potions" with sand and water, seeing how high you could climb up a tree. As children we meet the unknown with a sense of wonder and joy, endlessly exploring what we have come to dismiss as ordinary, whether it be a stick, a bug, or an oak leaf.

As we grow, we carry these memories with us, acquiring new perspectives like threads. Our relationship with the natural world is a complex, ever-evolving tapestry of stories. This relationship is a process without an end product. We cannot know all there is to know about the natural world.

In contrast, our modern life is driven by achievements. We see nature as less of a necessity and more of a hobby. But what if we were to reprioritize time spent in the natural world as productive? What if our responsibility as citizens is to learn all we can and pass it on to others? The greater our understanding of a subject, the more compelled we are to care for it. Learning new perspectives leaves us with new pathways of connection and care.

Each experience in nature is an invitation to see the world differently, whether it be through the eyes of the last Range Light Keeper of Baileys Harbor in the early 1900s, through the words of a poet wandering Wintergreen Trail, or through an artist's rendition of Sandy Swale.

Just as they were when we were young, curiosity and awe remain the building blocks of stewardship. By sharing what inspires us, we can positively impact the experiences of others and build thriving relationships with the natural world.

Those of us who visit or live in Door County are incredibly privileged. The peninsula has over 300 miles of Lake Michigan shoreline, over 30,000 acres of protected land and wetlands, and over 100 art galleries. The county is a confluence of beauty, conservation, and expression. In our ever-hectic world, these spaces provide the space for us to reconnect with the land.

The Festival of Nature creates an opportunity to reconnect with the natural world and to *ground* ourselves in the present moment. Each field trip invites us to be present, create, and listen to the world around us. Through our amazing partners, we can learn from different perspectives. Imagine what you can learn from others who also care deeply about this place, both land and people.

We hope you'll join us in reconnecting with the beauty of the natural world and grounding yourself in perspectives that inspire enduring care for this remarkable place.



PLANNING YOUR TRIP

Transportation

Transportation for field trips is NOT provided unless indicated in the trip description. Carpooling may be an option for some trips and will be managed at your and the trip leader's discretion. Some field trips may require a Wisconsin State Park Pass. Passes can be purchased at the entrances to state parks.

Construction

A portion of Highway 57 will be closed for construction during the Festival of Nature. The detour will start at the intersection of Highway 57 and County Road T south of Jacksonport and will end at the intersection of Highway 57 and County Road V in Jacksonport. Please plan for extended travel times between field trips. You can visit the Festival of Nature website to see a map of the detour and driving directions to all field trips.

Field Trip Tips

Please plan to arrive 15 minutes early to check in with your trip leader. We suggest bringing your own bug repellent, sunscreen, water, and appropriate footwear and clothing.

Weather

Be prepared for variable weather throughout the season. Lake breezes moderate the local temperatures and can change within a matter of hours. Field trips will run rain or shine but will cancel in the chance of severe or threatening weather conditions.

Meals

Meals are not included in the registration fees.

Where to Stay

REGISTRATION

The 2025 Festival of Nature offers a full slate of field trips, classes, and activities throughout Door County. **NEW this year: Registration opens Monday, March 17 for Ridges members and Wednesday, March 19 for the public.** For member registration instructions, visit the Festival of Nature website. There is a maximum number of participants allowed for each field trip or program. Registering early is the best way to ensure you get to participate in the activities you want. Registration is easy – go to doorcountyfestivalofnature.org or call 920-839-2802. We'll confirm your registration by email.

*Registering online offers the best chance of securing your spot in the field trips of your choosing. You are welcome to call The Ridges if you are unable to register online, but please be patient and understand that staff does not have the capacity to answer all phone calls immediately when registration opens. Because we will not be able to check voicemails until later in the day, please keep trying until you get through to someone.

WALK-IN REGISTRATION AND FIELD TRIP RESOURCES

Pre-Registration is required for all Festival of Nature programs. Walk-in registration is available at the Cook-Albert Fuller Nature Center during business hours. Please check our website for the most current Nature Center hours as they change throughout the year.

Program packet materials with driving directions, special instructions, and your itinerary will be included in your registration confirmation email. Please keep the email handy for future reference. PROGRAM FEES

Program fees per field trip vary from \$30 to \$65 per person, per program. Prices are listed in each program description. Program prices for youth under the age of 16 are 50% of the full price.* When registering as a member or as youth, please be prepared to provide membership details and/or date of birth in the registration portal.

Please note the location of your field trip. A park pass may be required unless otherwise indicated for field trips in a state park.

CANCELLATION AND REFUND POLICY


The *Door County Festival of Nature* reserves the right to cancel an activity or field trip when necessary. If a trip is canceled, you will be notified as soon as possible so that you may select an alternate trip or receive a full refund. Please make sure to provide us with a phone number for last-minute communications. You can cancel your registration by email or phone. Cancellations made 30 days prior to the program start date will be refunded in full, minus a \$10 processing fee. Cancellations made between 8 and 29 days prior to the program start date will be refunded at 50% of the total fees. Refunds will not be issued for cancellations made less than 7 days prior to the program start date.

Some field trips with partners may have the opportunity to be rescheduled if canceled due to weather. We will reach out to participants directly in this case to determine a preferred solution to cancellation.

If you seek adventure that combines relaxation and education, the Björklunden seminars offer courses across a range of subjects at the lodge with ample time for reflection and exploring built into the schedule. historic Boynton Chapel is open for tours on Monday and Wednesday, 1-4pm, mid-June through August. The Chapel is available for weddings and bus tours too! Facilities are also available for rent subject to availability.

FIELD NOTES

The Ridges is excited to present Rachel Davis and Andrew Hipp as the 2025 Festival of Nature keynote speakers.

Rachel and Andrew have been collaborating formally as an artist (RD) and a writer (AH) for more than 20 years. They have published two books—Field Guide to Wisconsin Sedges and Oak Origins: From Acorns to Species and the Tree of Life—and several illustrated natural essays together. They are currently working on a series of paintings and essays based on the lakes of Northern Wisconsin, supported by a multiyear residency through the Drawing Water Program at UW Madison's Trout Lake Station.

Rachel and Andrew collaborate at the interface between art, literature, science, and natural history. Their work is in part documentation, seeing and recording what the natural world presents, then sharing it in their own ways. However, their collaboration moves beyond documentation and delineation. It also informs their individual work in art, education, and science. For Andrew, writing mediates between subjects of inquiry—a weevil escaping from an acorn, an early-emerging false rue anemone—and the processes that connect individual organisms. Sentences convey information, but they also give form to understanding. The writing complements his work as a researcher and herbarium curator. For Rachel, photographing plants, fungi and insects is a first step to discovering the formal in the natural. Painting, drawing, natural dyes, and printmaking are ways to distill the shapes of plants, the light reflected off the water, mosses seen through a magnifying lens, and lichens into patterns. The rearrangement of shapes from the landscape with colors found in nature engages and feeds her as an artist and as a teacher.

Field Notes will illustrate how Rachel and Andrew's collaboration both reveals and exists in parallel with the natural world, while presenting their understanding of how integrating art, science, and natural history have changed their respective practices.

PRESENTER BIOS

Rachel received her B.A. from the State University of New York at Plattsburgh in 1992 and her M.F.A. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1997. Rachel's paintings and prints have been exhibited in national venues including the Holter Museum of Fine Art in Helena, Montana; Evergreen Galleries in Olympia, Washington; the Wisconsin Academy of Sciences, Arts and Letters in Madison, Wisconsin; and Project: Artspace in New York City, New York. Rachel works out of her home studio in Downers Grove and teaches natural dve classes at the Morton Arboretum and Lillstreet Art Center.

Andrew received his B.A. in English and his Ph.D. in botany from University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1994 and 2004, respectively. Andrew's scientific work on the evolution of plant diversity appears in a wide range of scholarly journals, and his creative work has been published in Arnoldia, Places Journal, International Oaks, Places Journal, and Scientific American. Andrew is the Director of the Herbarium and Plant Systematist at The Morton Arboretum and a lecturer at The University of Chicago.

ART EXHIBIT AND ARTIST RECEPTION

Paintings & Poems from The Ridges

This exhibition features plein-air oil paintings by Jeff Kunkel and poems written by Mary Elyn Bahlert. Jeff and Mary Elyn are husband and wife. Both were born and raised in Wisconsin, and both are lifetime members of The Ridges. They now live in Oakland, California and return to The Ridges often. The works on display have been composed on site and will grow over the next few seasons.

These works, in word and image, are personal responses to their favorite places in The Ridges and are offered in the hope that they might help you deepen your relationship to this unique landscape.

The exhibit will be on display beginning Thursday, May 22 at the Cook-Albert Fuller Nature Center and will remain on display for the summer. Pieces will be added to the exhibition throughout Memorial Day Weekend while artist Jeff Kunkel paints in the Sanctuary during the Festival of Nature. Artwork will be for sale, and all proceeds will support The Ridges Sanctuary's mission.

Jeff attended California College of Arts and Crafts in Oakland. He paints in oils in a style called plein air, which means outside, in the wind and sun and changing light. He paints loosely and quickly and completes a painting in one session. Not long ago, he was a Visiting Artist at the Cedarburg Bog near Cedarburg, Wisconsin.
